Barbados Signs Visa Waiver Agreement with China



Late last year the government of Barbados approved a reciprocal visa agreement with the People's Republic of China. Minister of Foreign Affairs and

Trade, Maxine Mc Clean, announced the agreement during a ceremonial signing of the protocol for the Provision of Military Aid Gratis to Barbados in December.

Mc Clean was quoted as saying, "In 2017 we will celebrate the 40th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Barbados and the People's Republic of China and of continuous support by Barbados of the One-China Policy. One distinct characteristic of the relations between Barbados and the People's Republic of China, especially within recent years, is that they have remained engaging and productive."

Mc Clean gave some examples of areas of cooperation such as the arrival of a Chinese medical team in Barbados to assist with the provision of medical care at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, and the Sixth Round of Consultations between the Ministries of Foreign Affairs of some Caribbean countries and China's Foreign Ministry, which took place last winter.

In the culture and education arena, the University of the West Indies Cavehill campus now has a Confucius Institute and includes a certification program in Chinese, which as of 2016 met the qualifications of the Caribbean Examinations Council.

A Century Later the Labour Party Remains a Voice in Local Politics



The Guardian newspaper sent a reporter to the districts that voted overwhelmingly in favor of Brexit. Doncaster was the first stop of seven towns

referred to as "Brexit land."

The article published last month led off with some historical trivia about the birth of the Labour Party. The Party was official in 1906 but it began with Thomas R Steels a railway signalman with the Great Northern Railroad who moved to Doncaster in 1891. Steels along with Jimmy Holmes felt that labor needed to be represented in the House of Commons and worked in earnest with unions, socialist and working class organizations to build a movement that eventually led to the creation of the Labour Party.

Doncaster is one of 36 districts in England with an elected Mayor and Council. Locals interviewed for the Guardian article included Labour Councillors. Some expressed the viewpoint that the elderly who are more likely to vote have different attitudes about many things, especially the impact of immigrants and the economy. Another blamed the media for distorting the issues around jobs and immigration policies. Both issues influenced the results in the metropolitan borough of Doncaster which has three MP's all of which represent the Labour Party. Doncaster voted 69% in favor of Brexit.

The MP for the Don Valley, Carolina Flint, voted in December to 'trigger Article 50,' the UK's formal notice of its intent to leave the EU though interestingly enough she voted to remain last year. She states on her blog, "*Free movement as we know it will end. The UK will put some rules in place to manage migration. We need fair rules, not an end to immigration. Both sides will need to compromise.*"

Across the pond in Wilmington last month the Sister Cities Association hosted a panel discussion on the Brexit referendum for the public, including British citizens living in the area. The panelists included Jim McLaughlin, Andrew Terrell and Dr. Paul Townend.

Jim is currently CEO of Axiall Ltd. and a regular contributor to the Business Connections Live online television channel and participated via Skype from London. Jim provided a good overview of what drove the campaign with data demonstrating that age, educational attainment and economic status more than location were the underpinnings of the desire to leave.

Andrew was recently appointed to the role of Consul for Government and Prosperity which is under the United Kingdom's Consulate General office based in Atlanta. He runs the United Kingdom's new trade office in North Carolina which is one of three new trade offices across the US. Andrew referred to the outcome as a democratic deficit meaning rural citizens wanted Westminster to set policy that affect their well-being and future prospects, not Brussels.

Paul is currently Vice Chancellor and Dean of Undergraduate Studies at the University of North Carolina in Wilmington received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. Paul's research interests are focus on the junctures between popular culture and politics, the development of Irish nationalism and social movements. Paul was able to present a historical perspective on the origins of forming a union following WWII and looked at the parallels between the recent US elections and what happened in the UK.
